

ACID FOLK 2022 Acrylic gouache, ink and lacquer on board Original Signed on the reverse 86cm x 86cm Sold in a tray frame






PARADISE VERSION

I approached the writing of this statement with some degree of hesitancy. Paradise Version is a collection of paintings celebrating my love for music. The expectation then, is that I write a few words about my love for music. And when writing about music, there's a flexi-disc's* thickness between an earnest attempt at putting sound into words and unabridged arseholery. This show extols the efforts of others who tread that finest of lines: record store reviewers dropping vocabulary persuasive enough to make you hungry to hear the track they're enthusing over. This is the fantastically esoteric world of record collecting where the shortest battery of words can go some way to cracking the code of a new release.

DOOM LADEN AMEN ROLLER for instance, is indecipherable without knowing that the word AMEN refers to the four-bar drum break on the 1969 track Amen. Brother by the soul group The Winstons. This is the most sampled break in the history of music and forms the basis of lots of early hip hop and the backbone to thousands of jungle and drum and bass tunes. ROLLER means a consistent loop of bass and/or drums that roll over and over throughout the track. DOOM-LADEN more obviously suggests the mood. So, from those four words I know I can expect a dark, rolling drum and bass record in the style of say, Ed Rush. During the past five years I have taken a deep dive into the world of words and language.



An attempt at saying as much as possible with as few words as possible led to an exploration of Tristan Tzara's Dadaist 'cut-up' technique where I discovered for myself the lyrical power and shift in consciousness that can be achieved by subverting the normal word order and its semantic meaning.

For me, these pithy and spare record store reviews share that same evocative, poetic power. Descriptions such as LUSH **DESPAIRING DARK WAVE not** only go some way to deciphering a record (dark wave is the genre) they also, like the best flash fiction, suggest other, more elaborate interpretations. Who hasn't felt the metaphorical, melancholic crash of a lush, despairing, dark wave at some point in their lives? While these combinations of words can be enjoyed on their own merit, as a record collecting geek I do appreciate the levels of

encrypted knowledge they

contain. I also accept that as boundless and open as music is, it can be intimidating if you're not au fait with the increasingly obscure nomenclature of its endlessly stacking genres. Music and record collecting is paradoxical that way. You have an inexhaustible resource at your disposal and you're entirely welcome to explore all of it. And yet, exploring a new area can be daunting.

Back in the day, certain record store clerks would revel in their status as gatekeepers and go out of their way to make you feel like a dick for not knowing your *Miami bass* from your *footwork*. Nowadays of course, you can do your learning and make your own musical connections online. Oscar Wilde contended that 'music is the art...which most completely realises the artistic idea, and is the condition to which all other arts are constantly aspiring'.



If you accept that the point of art is to move people; to reflect the times; to galvanise; to provide relief, release and understanding, then I think it's difficult to disagree with his thinking.

There are beautiful films, books, paintings, plays and sculpture but you don't carry them through your life the way you do music. They can certainly move you but they don't provide a backdrop to your existence in the way music soundtracks it. Like Velcro, music and memories marry interlocking through hooks and loops. Music is defined by the way it fastens people, ideas and movements together. It's a utopian model for successful coexistence and cross-pollination. It succeeds in attaining what the

writer and DJ Joe Muggs calls 'cultural hybridity'. Music makes sense of the world. It's an infinite black hole, taking

whatever we throw at it. War,

politics, disaster, love, hate, birth, death – all human experience is pitched its way, processed and broadcast back to us in ways we can understand.

Music embraces, co-opts and masters new technology to produce life- affirming art. When was the last time you saw a piece of digital art in a gallery that truly moved you?

Music invented teenagers. Music makes drugs work. And with the right sound system, music physically hits you (though as Bob Marley sings, 'you feel no pain' when it does). The bassline reverberates through you. If your chest ain't rattling, it ain't happening.

Outside of my family and friends, the thing I'm most grateful for is my passion for music. I lose myself in it. I find myself in it. Tim Fishlock, January 2022 *Google it, youngsters.
